Inductive Bible Study Guide: 1 Corinthians 3:1-15



Step 1: Observation – What does the passage say?

Read 1 Corinthians 3:1–15 slowly and carefully, more than once. Let yourself really see what's there before trying to interpret it.

Observation Prompts:

- Who is being spoken to, and how are they described?
- What metaphors or images does Paul use?
- What is said about building, foundations, and judgment?
- Are any warnings or promises included?

Read the passage and take note of the following:
1. How does Paul describe the Corinthians in verses 1–4?
2. What behaviors does Paul connect with spiritual immaturity?
3. What metaphors does Paul use to describe ministry in verses 5–9?

4. What is said about the foundation in verses 10–11?
5. What materials are used in the building metaphor (vv.12–15)? What happens to each
Step 2: Interpretation – What does the passage mean?
Now we explore what the passage means within the context of Paul's letter and the broader message of the gospel.
Context:
Paul is calling out the Corinthians for their jealousy , division , and spiritual immaturity . They've been treating ministry leaders like celebrities and clinging to personalities rather that the gospel. Paul reminds them that only Jesus is the true foundation , and everything we bu on that foundation will be tested.
Questions to Explore:
1. What does it mean to be "people of the flesh" (v.1) and not ready for solid food?
2. Why is it dangerous to cling to human leaders like Paul, Apollos, or Cephas? What does that reveal about spiritual pride?

3.	According to Paul, who really causes spiritual growth? (v.6–7)
4.	What is the significance of each person building on the foundation of Christ (v.10–11)?
5.	What do the materials (gold, silver, hay, straw, etc.) represent in verses 12–15? What does it mean for our work to be "tested by fire"?
6.	What reward is mentioned for those whose work endures? What happens to those whose work burns?
•	Fleshly (v.3): Greek sarkikos — driven by natural desires, worldly. Foundation (v.11): Greek themelios — a base layer for building, foundational truth. Reward (v.14): Greek misthos — wages, fruit, outcome of labor. Tested by fire (v.13): Refers to God's judgment—revealing the true quality of our
•	work.

Step 3: Application – How should I respond?

This passage invites us to examine the quality and motive behind the life we're building on Jesus. Are we seeking His glory, or our own?			
Personal Reflection:			
1. Am I still living spiritually immature—focused on myself, my preferences, or division	1?		
2. How do I view leaders or ministries? Do I idolize personalities, or seek Christ?			
3. What kind of "materials" am I building with in my life, home, or ministry? (Gold and silver = eternal things; wood and straw = temporary things.)			
4. What would it look like to build intentionally with things that last?			
5. How can I cultivate humility in how I serve, lead, or follow?			

Summary Truths:

- Spiritual maturity is marked by unity, humility, and dependence on God.
- Ministry is **God's work** we plant and water, but He causes growth.
- Our lives and service will be **tested** only what's built on Christ will last.
- Every believer is building something. The question is: What are you building, and why?

Optional Memory Verse:

"For no one can lay a foundation other than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ." — 1 Corinthians 3:11 (ESV)

Prayer Prompt:

"Jesus, You are the foundation of my life. Help me build with what will last. Burn away anything that's just for show, and teach me to live and lead in a way that honors You and strengthens others."
