Inductive Bible Study Guide: 1 Corinthians 7:1-24



Step 1: Observation – What does the passage say?

Read 1 Corinthians 7:1–24 carefully, more than once. This passage covers several topics related to marriage, singleness, and staying faithful to God's calling in whatever situation you're in..

Observation Prompts:

- What specific questions or issues is Paul responding to?
- What commands or principles does Paul give?
- What words or phrases are repeated?
- How does Paul balance freedom and responsibility?

Read the passage and note what you see:			
What questions from the Corinthians does Paul address in verses 1–2?			
What instructions does Paul give to husbands and wives in verses 3–5?			
How does Paul describe singleness and marriage in verses 6–9?			

What command does Paul give to married believers about separation or divorce in verses 10–11
How does Paul instruct believers who are married to unbelievers in verses 12–16?
What principle does Paul teach in verses 17–24 about staying in one's calling?
Step 2: Interpretation – What does the passage mean?
Paul responds to questions about marriage and singleness in the Corinthian church. Some believers were confused about whether celibacy was more spiritual, or if marriage was still valuable. Paul teaches that both singleness and marriage are gifts from God, and that faithfulnes in one's current calling is what matters most.
Questions to Explore:
What does Paul mean by "it is good for a man not to have relations with a woman"? (v.1) How does this fit with his next statement in verse 2?

What principle about mutual authority in marriage does Paul emphasize in verses 3–5?	
Why does Paul call both marriage and singleness gifts? (vv.6–9) What strengths and challoes each present?	llenges
What does Paul say about divorce between two believers? (vv.10–11) How does he ground in Jesus' teaching?	nd this
Why does Paul allow a believer to stay married to an unbeliever if the unbeliever is willi (vv.12–14) What does he mean by the unbelieving spouse being "sanctified"?	ng?

• Conjugal rights (v.3): mutual obligation of intimacy within marriage.				
• Self-control (v.9): Greek <i>egkrateuomai</i> to exercise restraint or mastery over desires.				
• Sanctified (v.14): set apart or influenced by holiness through the believing spouse's presence.				
• Calling (v.17): God's divine assignment or station in life where He calls believers to liv				
faithfully. • Bought with a price (v.23): redeemed by Christ's sacrifice; we now belong to Him.

Step 3: Application – How should I respond?
